- Sports facilities including gym need to be improved.
- Job oriented/value added/skill development courses need to be introduced.
- Effective measures may be initiated to reduce drop-out rate which is very high.
- Instruction hours of morning shift need to be increased on a par with the day shift.
- Number of class rooms need to be increased.
- A well equipped auditorium may be a requirement.
- Transport facility may be provided to the students from villages.
- Harnessing of solar power may be expedited.




